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The Rush Is On

Last May, the Faculty Committee on Student Activities and Services (FCSAS) approved the Inter Fraternity Council's request to extend rushing to lower freshmen. I.F.C. envisioned this extension as a method of meeting the increasing competition from house plans by introducing the incoming students to fraternities.

Although the start of the rushing period was not even in sight during the first week of September, some fraternities had already launched their membership drives. It was done in an entirely legal manner-through participation as student volunteers in the Big Brother-Big Sister and Student Aide programs. Both of these programs are designed to ease the problem of integrating entering freshmen into the Queens student body by permitting them to meet and talk with upper classmen who have had all of the same problems.

These two programs are of high value and provide benefits for all of the parties concerned. The advantages to the school and the freshman are obvious. Dividends are also provided for the campus organizations which supply the volunteer upper classmen. Since personal contact is the best way of attracting new members, those organizations best represented by Big Brothers and Big Sisers and Student Aides possess a headstart in their membership campaigns even before classes start.

At a time when house plans will face direct competition from fraternities for lower freshmen, I would have expected to see many house plan members serving as volunteers. The very obvious advantage to participation was not

CHP Constitutional Revisions Planned

Since 1959, the many functions of CHP have been restricted by an awkwardly-phrased, out-dated Constitution. Therefore, attempts are being made to alleviate the Constitution of the obstacles curbing the efficiency of CHP.

Since CHP's main concern is for the life of the individual house plan, it is considering removing the restriction on house plan membership. For the past year, each house plan has been confined to sixty members. Under the newly-proposed Constitution, a ten-member minimum is the only limitation.

Another issue vital to the working of the body of CHP is the election of its officers. The new standards shall require that the President be a Junior and the Vice-President, an Upper Sophomore; each having a 2.25 index. For other members of the Executive Board a 2.0 will be necessary. Furthermore, officers must have attended twenty-five percent of

Filling the shoes of the Presidency is former Publicity Chairman and one time Sports Editor of CASTLE, Al Hausman. Joan Rosen, of One Way Inn, will help Al provide the thoughtful leadership vital to CHP in her duties as Vice-President. Aloha's Arlene Kleinman will handle CHP's financial joys and problems as Treasurer for the second year in a row. Open House is well represented in having three of its members-Debbie Zilvinskis, Lorraine Mann, and Wendy Scherne-on the Board as Recording Secretary, Social Secretary, and Corresponding Secretary, respectively. Wendy is the only newcomer, Debbie having been the former Female Athletic Director and Lorraine having served as Social Function Chairman last year.

This year's Membership Chairman, Hank Levy, is from Playboys' Penthouse. Taking care of all scheduling and conferences as Calendar Chairman is Sue Tabin, past president of Desiree and former CASTLE editor. Gary Reinstein will have a major hand in planning and carrying out social events as Social Function Chairman, while Harry Kent, besides his other duty as president of the Senior Class, will act as Male Athletic Director.
